This measure amends the Oklahoma State Statutes. A yes vote legalizes the licensed use, sale, and growth of marijuana in Oklahoma for medicinal purposes. A license is required for use, the possession of marijuana for medicinal purposes and must be approved by a physician, and users must be 18 years or older and an Oklahoma resident. The punishment for unlicensed possession of permitted amounts of marijuana, for individuals who can state a medical condition, is a fine not exceeding \$400. A 7% state tax is imposed on medical marijuana sales.

It changed the classification of certain drug possession and property crimes from a felony to a misdemeanor, made possession of a limited quantity of drugs a misdemeanor, and changed the classification of certain drug possession crimes to misdemeanors. The measure increased the threshold dollar amount used for determining whether certain property crimes are considered a felony or misdemeanor from \$500 to \$1000. This measure passed and became effective July 1, 2017.
